## PROMOTING BRITISH VALUES

In 2011, the government defined British Values as democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. We promote these values through our school vision, values and aims, our curriculum and teaching and learning strategies, our promotion of SMSC and the enrichment activities in which our pupils participate.

Value	How we promote it
Democracy Links to school values: Cooperation, Responsibility	<ul> <li>All members of our school community were involved in the creation of our shared values in 2019. Children in each class create a class code to reflect the behaviours we expect to see to live our values in school and daily life.</li> <li>We have an elected school council that meets every term. In September, candidates prepare election speeches and two pupils from each class in Years R – 6 are elected as class</li> <li>representatives. This mirrors the electoral process.</li> <li>Children are involved in key decisions about aspects of school life such as how to spend donated funds, organise charity fund raising, promoting of antibullying themes.</li> <li>We encourage volunteerism in and out of school. This includes things like the Sports Leaders, Language Leaders and also raising money for local and national charities.</li> <li>Weekly circle time or PSHE time ensures that pupils have a voice in all year groups.</li> </ul>



	Children's opinions are listened to; for example, children raise issues which are then brought to school council meetings and pupils are empowered to advocate for change not only by raising matters through class, eco and reflective area councils but also by making individual appointments with the head teacher to discuss issues of concern or interest. Pupil surveys and discussion groups are carried out throughout the year to gain the views of pupils on a wide range of topics.
The rule of law Links to school values: Cooperation, Responsibility	<ul> <li>We have high expectations about pupil conduct and this is reflected in our School Behaviour Policy</li> <li>There are rewards for good behaviour consistent with the behaviour policy. Across the whole school children can earn house points for making the right choices. In addition, teachers write postcards for children each week who have shown behaviours in line with our vision and values. Children understand the behaviour policy and the consequences of making inappropriate choices.</li> <li>As part of our Behaviour Policy, parents are informed when their child has behaved in a way that is not consistent with our vision and values and behaviour plans written alongside parents are used to address persistently inappropriate behaviour.</li> <li>Through our school vision and values and the Christian texts that underpin them, children are taught about respecting themselves and each other; to work collaboratively and to take responsibility for their own learning and</li> </ul>
	actions.
Individual liberty  Links to school values: Aspiration, Empathy, Cooperation, Friendship, Responsibility, Resilience	<ul> <li>Through our school vision and values, our identity as a growth mindset school and through our bespoke curriculum, particularly in PSHCE, children are taught about personal responsibility, the</li> </ul>



courage to stand up for what is right,
resilience and aspiration.

- Learning Hero awards are given specifically to encourage the development of good learning behaviours and growth mindset attributes are taught and nurtured through daily teaching and our collective worship programme.
- PSHE lessons have specific units relating to individual liberty including 'Being me in my world.'
- Children are taught how to keep themselves safe, including on-line. This is done through computing lessons where it is woven through the whole curriculum at every year group and esafety visits from the local PCSO, as well as through the PSHE curriculum.
- Bullying is not tolerated; we have a robust Anti-bullying Policy and take part in anti-bullying week activities.
- Weekly circle and calm-me time in PSHE lessons gives all children regular opportunities to explore critical thinking issues and develop their ability to discuss their opinions and work together to explore how they may disagree or agree with each other. We also scaffold children's language around this, encouraging them to 'support or challenge' or to 'build' on what their classmates say.
