Welcome to the next of our curriculum newsletters!

Our geography units are designed to stimulate curiosity about the world around us. We focus on both human and physical geography and will explore topics such as map skills, climates across the globe, and how human activities impact our environment. We also delve into local geography, helping the children to understand their part in their own community and location of the Wychwoods and how it connects to the wider world. In line with our commitment to sustainability, we are also incorporating the Eco Schools initiative into our curriculum, where we will be looking at topics such as sustainability, recycling, energy and healthy living.

Below are the questions and topics your children will be focusing on:

EYFS	Where are the coldest places on Earth?	Where in the world shall we go?	Where does our food come from?
KS1	Is the weather forecast always right?	What is it like to live in Costa Rica?	Do we still need maps?
LKS2	What do rocks tell us about the way earth was formed?	Why do people go on holiday to the Mediterranean?	River Study
UKS2	Why should we be protecting the rainforests?	Does the earth have enough for everyone?	What have we discovered about our world?
